Restoring **Native** Habitat



The Aquabonita Flyfishers will be hosting James Erdman from the Bishop Field Office of California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) at its Tuesday, 5 April, meeting. Since 1996 staff have been researching and restoring habitat for native frog populations in the Eastern Sierra in response to the observed decline of the Sierra Nevada yellowlegged frog. The CDFW initiated several actions to meet the state's responsibility to manage wildlife and their habitats for multiple uses. The two most important actions were 1) to temporarily suspend non-native fish stocking in high mountain lakes and 2) to initiate the High Mountain Lakes Project (HML) which is an effort to inventory the aquatic vertebrate species (fish and amphibians) and their habitat between 4,500 to 12,000 feet in the Sierra Nevada range. Along with these two actions, a dialogue was initiated with researchers, other government agencies, and user groups to discuss management of the Sierra Nevada

Preserving Backcountry Fishing aquatic ecosystems. This continu-

ing project is closing the gap in baseline data necessary to develop biologically sound long term aquatic biodiversity management plans specific to hydrologic basins of the Sierra Nevada. CDFW anticipates that development and implementation of these plans will help stabilize and reverse negative effects of non-native fish introductions on native frog populations while maintaining viable recreational angling at a historic use pattern. There are 22 lakes and associated waters that are fishless and being managed for native frogs.

The Aguabonita Flyfishers program begins at 7:30 PM Tuesday 5 April at the United Methodist Church (639 N Norma). All fly fishers, want -to-be fly fishers, any kind of fisher, or just interested in fishing and the environment are welcome.

Excerpt from Feb. 2006 Flyline Article "High Mountain Lakes Project"

Jim was born and raised in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania and is the son of a dentist and avid fisherman. His father took him on fishing trips from the time he was 5 to 6 years old and together they traipsed the streams of eastern Pennsylvania and the Pocono Mountains. Jim fondly remembers these trips more as exploring the outdoors than actually fishing. He would easily be distracted by the other animals, snakes, frogs, and toads, salamanders, etc. and often brought these animals home in his creel or vest satchel to the great surprise of his mother. Thus, the seeds were planted to inspire a lifelong journey of adventure and exploration of the natural world.

Jim has lived in Bishop since March 1999 but has been visiting the Eastern Sierra since the early 1980's to hike, fish, ski and climb in these spectacular mountains. After moving to Bishop, Jim worked for the Inyo National Forest for 6 years as a "Trails Data Collection Specialist which required that he hike, map (GPS) and condition survey every trail in the forest. It took four summers of 800-1000 miles of hiking every summer to accomplish this task. In 2005 he began working for the CDFW.

Jim has spent a decade [written in 2006] now managing the recreational fisheries of Inyo and Mono Counties and still spends 5 - 6 months a year in the back country working to recover the Sierra Nevada Yellow-legged frog an monitoring wilderness fisheries. Jim believes he is truly one of the lucky folks who enjoys the work he does and the inspiration is may provide to a future generation of wilderness stewards.





I hope you enjoyed the outstanding presentation by Jeff Currier that Lloyd arranged. The excellent advertising brought more members; three new members and several prospective members.

I got to use the excellent information Brad gave us along with my internet research on fishing Pyramid Lake. As always, fishing a new water type is a learning experience, but that is for those like me, a fun endeavor. I hooked 4 nice fish my 1st day and brought one to the net. I also hooked several the second day and brought one to the net. Those around me, said the fish I got into shore on the third day was a 10 pounder, but I lost it when my netter was 10 yards away on the beach. The weather that day was blowing snow and temperatures around freezing. (The previous day) I quit fishing an hour early after getting blown off balance three times, teetering above the 45 degree water. I mostly stripped streamers and balanced leeches with a Popcorn Beetle in lead or trail by 3 feet. Frequently, my fingers were too cold to continue fishing. Camping right at the beach was very nice to warm up.



"Lessons Learned"

- Finger-less gloves are not sufficient for me and using a nitrile glove below helps, but I almost never changed flies so full finger is worth a try.
- Fleece sweatpants are much better than two pairs of long johns, (this shortened my time at Warrior Point.)
- Heated seats in your vehicle or fishing near a trailer is great for warming.
- Check your flies for algae often.
- Strip, strip, strip after you hook up and don't worry about the reel unless the fish is large, under control, and is not manageable with finger tension alone. (1st loss).
- Play the fish until it is under control and keep line taught when getting off the ladder. (2nd loss).
- Don't let the fish get significantly behind you and especially near shore. (10 lb fish loss).
- When casting weighted streamers or lots of split shot wear glasses. I think Cocoons "Wrap Arounds" are awesome for all fishing situations. They block side light, and come in colors for various lighting conditions.
- Get a large boat net and don't force the netting.
- Bringing a buddy gets a faster netting offer.
- Check often that your rod pieces are snug. I had a separation resulting in connector cracking while casting.

March Program Flashback: New Faces, New Places, and Fantastic Fish" World's Best Trout Destinations - Jeff Currier



After dinner, everyone "regrouped" at the Methodist Church for program setup and perusal of the Currier's treasure trove of water color artwork and fishing related items








As folks began gathering for the meeting, several members, not recently seen, were in attendance along with several new faces. Be sure to invite your friends to become new members.

Gary's Contributions to the Aguabonita Flyfishers over the past 43 years

Gary was always willing and extremely able to support the newly established Ridgecrest flyfishing club in many ways throughout the past 43 years. Gary served as head of the first ABFF Officer nominating com-



mittee in 1979. In 1981 he volunteered to take on the task of the editor of the fledgling newsletter, as well as serving as Vice President thru 1982. In 1983-1984 Gary took over duties as President, all the while continuing as newsletter editor. In 1985 Gary continued as editor of the newly christened newsletter **"The Flyline".** In 1986 Gary took on the responsibility of chairing ABFF conservation efforts. In 1987-1988 Gary signed on as secretary. In 1989-1990 Gary again took over duties of President, In 1991-1992, as Past President, Gary began his long standing support and coordination of the Annual



Banquet planning committee. Additionally, in 1993 and 1994 Gary served as a board member. In 1993 Gary also began his artistic endeavors in the framing and display of flyfishing artwork and dry fly presentations. In 1994 Gary

again served as a board member. In May of 1995 Gary donated (the first of many to follow) expertly matted and framed fly plates to the SWCFFF conclave. From 1996 thru 2000 Gary along with Jay Crawford and Lew Albright planned and executed the annual ABFF banquets. In 1997- 2022 Gary continued applying his matting and framing skills to produce club Membership Fly Plates and framed artwork for ABFF Banquets, FFF and SWC International Conclaves., as well as Friends of the



Inyo. In 2003-2005 Gary again stepped in to fill the VP slot. In 2008 Gary (a bass fishing enthusiast) received a special ABFF club service recognition award and was presented with a Bob Ziesler, hand carved, hand painted largemouth bass. In 2009-2012 Gary volunteered to be ABFF publicity chairman. In November of 2012, Gary was among nine members from ABFF that assisted in the cleanup at the Mount Whitney Fish Hatchery. In the ensuing years Gary and wife Karen were consistent members the ABFF contingent at the annual fund raising BBQ at the Mount Whitney Fish Hatchery. SOME GUIDELINES FOR CATCH AND RELEASE ANGLING: (Source: www.PyramidLake.us)

The most important steps an angler can take to ensure a successful release are to hook and land the fish as quickly as possible, leave the fish in the water while removing the hook, and release the fish quickly. There are several other ways to improve survival rates:

- Whatever you do, do it quickly. Keeping an exhausted fish out of water is like holding a bag over a runner who has just completed a marathon. They both need oxygen to recuperate.
- Wet your hands or gloves before handling the fish. Do not drag the fish onto the sand or rocks; use a net in the water. Do not injure the eyes or gills. Placing the fish on a wet towel will help the fish retain its pro tective slime. To keep the fish still, place it on its back or cover its eyes with a wet towel. Control the fish at all times! If you drop the fish, its chances of injury and death increase.
- Decide beforehand which fish are to be kept; immediately release all others. Do not engage in a pro longed debate over whether or not to release the fish after the fish has been landed.



FISHING TIPS

Never place a fish in your live well intending to release it later if you catch a larger one. Once you make a decision to keep a fish, stick with it. The fish you release from your live well have a decreased chance of survival.

- Avoid the use of gaffs, and never remove large fish from the water. Take a photograph of the fish in the water and release it.
- Refrain from holding fish in a vertical position when inspecting or photographing them. Internal organs are displaced and stress is increased in this unnatural position. Large fish should never be held by the bottom jaw only, with any tool designed to grip the lower jaw of caught fish to facilitate handling. Hold the fish horizontally by the lower jaw with one hand, and support the belly with the other hand. If unsupported, many large fish will rupture the isthmus a cartilaginous bundle of ligaments that connects the head and body--and the fish will die a slow death from starvation. This connection is necessary for the tremendous gulping action during feeding.
- If the hook is difficult to remove by hand, use long-nosed pliers or a hook-removal tool. Do not tear additional tissue by removing the hook. Back the hook through the original wound. If this fails, cut the leader and pull the hook forward through the injury.
- Use circle hooks. They cause less injury and increase catch rates.

• If your fish is in good shape, immediately return it to the water headfirst. If it does not swim or is erratic, some "resuscitation" may be needed until the fish can swim on its own. Revive exhausted fish by first placing one hand under the tail and holding the bottom lip with the other. If it is severely lethargic, de press the bottom lip to cause the jaw to gape and gently move the fish forward. Moving the fish in an erratic back and forth motion will just induce more stress. Have you ever seen a fish swim backward and forward? At the first sign of the fish attempting to swim away-let it go. Prolonged attempts at resuscitation will be stressful to the fish

Lower Owens Fire Summary and Photos: Phil Bowen

The fire started south of E. Line Street in Bishop. There was no sign of the fire looking south from E. Line Street.

A. The fire was about 1/4 mile wide on the Owens River at Warm Spring Road.

Fish had been planted and about 30-40 spin fisherman were catching fish 12-16 inches.

- B. No fisherman at Collins Road, fire was about 1/4 mile wide. Big Pine Canal had a good amount of water flowing.
- C. Fire was stopped at hwy 168 at Big Pine with the fire about 200 yards across. Fire seems to be contained solely to river bed and side roads contained it.
